The rehabilitation scientific and engineering literature is interdisciplinary, appears in diverse publications, and is not indexed by any single service. *Comprehensive* searches are so difficult, time-consuming, and costly that they are seldom undertaken. Consequently, relevant information is often missed by scientists, clinicians, and consumers. This delays the application of valuable findings to those who would benefit by them and also adds to the cost of research and engineering through needless duplication of previously accomplished professional work.

To help meet this need, expanded bibliographic coverage will be a regular feature of the *Journal of Rehabilitation Research and Development*. This issue presents two specialized bibliographies intended as ongoing references.
